PROGRAMMING/NOTABLE ACTIVITIES*

What a difference one motivated officer makes! Over eight years, only one Pi Sigma Alpha was interested in programming. And then, Lindsey Callahan came along. Unfortunately, Lindsey wasn't elected President, but she might have well have been. As Vice President she put so much time and effort into Pi Sigma Alpha. It was her idea to have the Primary Debate Watch and to make brochures and flyers. She has even created a brochure for the department that I hope will come out next year. She did all this while working on her yearlong senior thesis and graduating in three years! I will briefly describe the programming and notable activities we witness this year. The best part is that the leadership team for this year was very much involved in helping bring about the Primary Debate Watch and they are active on campus. Also, Lindsey left behind all of the work she did, so that we can use it in the future. I have very high hopes for next year. It would be so wonderful if we could see a change in the culture of students in our department!

- February 11th. Primary Debate Watch (campus community). This was a wonderful event! Lindsey had the idea for this last summer, and she found others to help sponsor the event (the Political Science Club and Student Activities). They picked a night that would work for RIC students, and, though they hoped to have events for both parties, there was never a convenient Republican debate to schedule around. They bought prizes, made t-shirts, advertised heavily, had a trivia contest, registered students to vote and had nearly 50 people from the campus community attend and participate. This may not seem like much, but for a RIC event, it was a big deal! In fact, the event was nominated for a STORGY Award (Student Organization Award) for best co-sponsored event. It lost out to a Festival of Lights that had about 50 student organization co-sponsors!
- February 13th. Lindsey headed to Washington D.C. I was so thrilled that Lindsey's paper was accepted to the Undergraduate Research Conference. I was a little worried that she might get her work ripped apart,

but instead, she got helpful and positive feedback. She had an amazing time (this was her first time in D.C.). I hope that Nicauris Heredia (our incoming president) is able to present her honors thesis at next year's conference.

- March 23rd. Alumni Luncheon. (open to Alumni and Political Science Department/students). Pi Sigma Alpha helped sponsor this event by advertising it and making programs. It was really neat to welcome back some Pi Sigma Alpha alumni!
- April 13th. Annual Induction Luncheon (members only plus a few invited guests). Treasurer Tina Tavares submitted a grant proposal for \$560 to help fund our annual Induction Luncheon. The luncheon was held in on April 13th and was a success; most inductees, as well as all four officers, were able to attend and we inducted an honorary member, Phil West, who has been involved in ethics reform in Rhode Island for years. You will find more information about the luncheon in the Chapter Activity Grant Report.
- April 16th. Accepted Students Day (community of accepted students).
 Lindsey accompanied the chair of the department and handout out brochures. She also has ideas for future Accepted Students days (like handing out pencils and having decorations to make our table stand out).
- Brochures/Fliers (for department and political science students). Lindsey created a flyer and brochure about the benefits of joining Pi Sigma Alpha. She put the flyers in the cups for the Primary Debate Watch. All new inductees received a brochure and they are also available to any student who walks by our lounge.
- We also had a student apply for a Washington Internship Scholarship.
 While she did not receive one, I was very pleased to have a student apply.
 I think this is only the second time that has happened at RIC.

FINANCES

The organization is unable to receive regular funds from Student Community Government due to its exclusive nature and we have no official budget. However, we decided, while writing our Constitution, to add a ten-dollar "local" fee to the \$30 (\$35 as of January, 2010) in dues required by the national office. The ten dollars per new member allows us to have some funds for programming as well as the purchase of medallions for our graduating seniors.** This spring, our Induction Luncheon cost \$415.00 (\$16 dollars per person for lunch plus lemonade, water and coffee); 25 people attended this event (including 19 students, four faculty and two honorary members). Fortunately, we once again received a Chapter Activity Grant (for \$490), which covered the entire cost of our luncheon. We hope that it is okay that we apply \$75 left over towards the cost of

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Dear Professors.


